

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
# Editorial NOTE

# THE CURSE C THE ACADEMIE

n unfortunate trend in education has long had parents of school-going children in its grip! Academies are the sine qua non for many: that which they feel they cannot do without.

Instead of working regularly, steadily and diligently at school, students are under the impression that 'Going to the Academy' is the key to success. And for reasons best known to them, parents have no qualms about sending their children out in the evening and forking out fees yet again for the education which their children are already supposed to be receiving at their day-time school.

I have always found this to be a very odd situation and one which smacks of corruption. It is surely obvious that an academy tutor who also teaches in a daytime institution has a vested interest in not teaching effectively during school hours in order to motivate his pupils to attend his classes in the evening where the real teaching will take place; this malpractice provides a nice little double earner for the teacher.

Academies can also lead to absenteeism in schools; some parents allow their children to sleep late and to take days off school because they can catch up at the academy on concepts missed at school. This teaches children that regularity and constant application and effort are not particularly important - an unsound principle for a young person, I would have thought, as is also the parents' willingness to pay twice for the same thing; this surely teaches a young person to have a casual disregard for his/her parents' hard-earned money: "Let them pay twice!"

A good school aims for academic excellence and also to inculcate moral values and good habits in its pupils: diligence, honesty, kindness, respect, tolerance and integrity, whilst academies aim at A grades (and are sometimes not too concerned about how they get them.)It seems to be accepted that leaked examination papers are an excellent way of attaining an A grade and, failing that, tutors nowadays provide 'guess papers 'for their students so that the pampered darlings do not have to actually revise their course but work only to the questions 'guessed at'. Study Skills courses train students to revise double the number of topics as there are questions in the paper, plus

two more. So for a four question paper, one is advised to revise thoroughly ten topics. But with a tutor and his 'guess paper', if not the leaked paper itself, only a loser need bother with that much work!

In other ways, too, academies may provide an easy alternative to using one's brain: students can benefit a great deal from thinking about what has been taught in class that day, reading and revising, it, writing up their notes in a neat and accessible way and writing essays or solving problems to consolidate their learning. There is no time to do this, however, if they come home from school and, after lunch and a brief rest, are off to the academy.

Since the popularity of academies has always puzzled me, I have tried to work out why parents submit to them and following are some tentative conclusions: it appears that schools generally fail to accept criticism of their teachers and are affronted by such criticism; parents feel that, if they complain, their child will be targeted by members of staff; parents therefore have no choice, if the teacher at school is incompetent, but to seek help elsewhere and keep quiet about their concerns. A shocking state of affairs! Schools should welcome feedback from parents and should have no need to be defensive, let alone antagonistic, if they are providing the teaching for which the parents are paying. And if not, then changes must be made!

Secondly, since young people here have far fewer opportunities for social interaction outside the bounds of family than do young people in the West, academies provide a morally acceptable reason for young people to go out at night and spend time with others of their own age. Young people need to do this, and want to do it, (particularly when they see it in movies all the time) but how are parents to explain this to the phupoos and tayas?

"Oh, he's at the academy! SUCH a serious student! Such a hardworking boy!"

Now all of the above is not to suggest that there are no serious teachers or students at academies; I know that there are; but sometimes, I just wish they'd take their seriousness and put it to good use in schools!





# The Roots of Pakistan's Education

t independence, Pakistan had a poorly educated population and few schools or universities. Although the education system has expanded greatly since then, debate continues about the curriculum, and, except in a few elite institutions, quality remained a crucial concern of educators in the early 1990s.

Adult literacy is low, but improving. In 1992 more than 36 percent of adults over fifteen were literate, compared with 21 percent in 1970. The rate of improvement is highlighted by the 50 percent literacy achieved among those aged fifteen to nineteen in 1990. School enrollment also increased, from 19 percent of those aged six to twenty-three in 1980 to 24 percent in 1990. However, by 1992 the population over twenty-five had a mean of only 1.9 years of schooling. This fact explains the minimal criteria for being considered literate: having the ability to both read and write (with understanding) a short, simple statement on everyday life.

Relatively limited resources have been allocated to education, although there has been improvement in recent decades. In 1960 public expenditure on education was only 1.1 percent of the gross national product (GNP); by 1990 the figure had risen to 3.4 percent. This amount compared poorly with the 33.9 percent being spent on defense in 1993. In 1990 Pakistan was tied for fourth place in the world in its ratio of military expenditures to health and education expenditures. Although the government enlisted the assistance of various international donors in the education efforts outlined in its Seventh Five-Year Plan (1988-93), the results did not measure up to expectations.

In early times, and to some extend now as well -Education is/was organized into five levels: primary (grades one through five); middle (grades six through eight); high (grades nine and ten, culminating in matriculation); intermediate (grades eleven and twelve, leading to an F.A. diploma in arts or F.S. science; and university programs leading to undergraduate and advanced degrees. Preparatory classes (nursery) were formally incorporated into the system in 1988 with the Seventh Five-Year Plan.

In 1991 there were 87,545 primary schools, 189,200 primary school teachers, and 7,768,000 students enrolled at the primary level, with a student-to-teacher ratio of forty-one to one. Just over one-third of all children of primary school age were enrolled in a school in 1989. There were 11,978 secondary schools, 154,802 secondary school teachers, and 2,995,000 students enrolled at the secondary level, with a student-to- teacher ratio of nineteen to one.

Primary school dropout rates remained fairly consistent in the 1970s and 1980s, at just over 50 percent for boys and 60 percent for girls. The middle school dropout rates for boys and girls rose from 22 percent in 1976 to about 33 percent in 1983. However, a noticeable shift occurred in the beginning of the 1980s regarding the post primary dropout rate: whereas boys and girls had relatively equal rates (14 percent) in 1975, by 1979-- just as Zia initiated his government's Islamization program--the dropout rate for boys was 25 percent while for girls it was only 16 percent. By 1993 this trend had dramatically reversed, and boys had a dropout rate of only 7 percent compared with the girls' rate of 15 percent.

In drafting the Eighth Five-Year Plan in 1992, the government therefore reiterated the need to mobilize a large share of national resources to finance education. To improve access to schools, especially at the primary level, the government sought to decentralize and democratize the design and implementation of its education strategy. To give parents a greater voice in

running schools, it planned to transfer control of primary and secondary schools to NGOs. The government also intended to gradually make all high schools, colleges, and universities autonomous, although no schedule was specified for achieving this ambitious goal.

Three initiatives characterized reform efforts in education in the late 1980s and early 1990s: privatization of schools that had been nationalized in the 1970s; a return to English as the medium of instruction in the more elite of these privatized schools, reversing the imposition of Urdu in the 1970s; and continuing emphasis on Pakistan studies and Islamic studies in the curriculum. One of the education reforms of the 1980s was an increase in the number of technical schools throughout the country. The system aimed to increase the share of students going to technical and vocational institutions to over 33 percent by increasing the number of polytechnics, commercial colleges, and vocational training centers. Although the numbers of such institutions did increase, a compelling need to expand vocational training further persisted in early 1994.


In contemporary era, the education system of Pakistan is roughly comprised of 260,903 institutions and is facilitating 41,018,384 students with the help of 1,535,461 teachers. The system includes 180,846 public institutions and 80,057 private institutions. Hence 31% educational institutes are run by private sector while 69% are public institutes.

The year 2015 is important in the context that it marks the deadline for the participants of Dakar declaration (Education for All [EFA] commitment) including Pakistan. Education related statistics coupled with Pakistan's progress regarding education targets set in Vision 2030 and Pakistan's lagging behind in achieving EFA targets and its Millennium Development Goals(MDGs) for education call for an analysis of the education system of Pakistan and to look into the issues and problems it is facing so that workable solutions could be recommended.

Since then, Pakistan has expressed its commitment to promote education and literacy in the country by education policies at domestic level and getting involved into international commitments on education. In this regard national education policies are the visions which suggest strategies to increase literacy rate, capacity building, and enhance facilities in the schools and educational institutes. MDGs and EFA programmes are global commitments of Pakistan for the promotion of literacy and that is the reason that today we have so much variety in our education courses at every level.

Previously there was no concept of O'levels and

A'levels, but now the situation is different. Now, every student wants to get education in a whole new different way which includes the pathway of innovation and interest. This journey of Pakistan's education system from early time till now had been a journey with many ups and downs, but the thing which is positive in these ups and downs is - at least the education system of Pakistan has renovated itself from the scratch which has led to increase in educational standards and opportunities for students.







very single time you hear the world "memorization" it firstly clicks into mind about learning and remembering. Learning holds a great importance in one's life as the base of development and progress of human society. Whatever is learned that needs to be store in one's mind so that it may be utilized when required in future. In psychological terms, this very ability of brain to store the past experiences and learning to reproduce them for later use is known as "Memory". #### International community mourns slain Pakistani student in U

Members of the international education community have been offering their condolences and describing the murder of 10 victims including a 17-year old exchange student from Pakistan in a Texas school shooting as "profoundly heartbreaking". Sabika Sheikh was studying at Santa Fe High School as part of the Kennedy-Lugar Youth Exchange and Study Program when she was among those killed by a gunman on May 18. According to BBC reports, Sabika's funeral was among the first to be held, at a mosque in suburban Houston, with more than 3,000 members of the Texas Muslim community attending to pay tribute to the student who had described her acceptance on to the exchange program as the best thing that had ever happened to her.



#### International college students add \$2.4bn to US



International students studying at community colleges in the US contributed \$2.4billion to the US economy and supported more than 14,000 jobs in the 2016/17 academic year, a new analysis by NAFSA found. The analysis revealed that the economic contribution from international students at community colleges was over the \$100 million mark in five states, Florida, New York, Texas, Washington and California – with the latter almost reaching \$1bn. As for the jobs supported by these students, NAFSA calculated that for every six international students enrolled in community colleges, one US job is created and supported by their spending in education, accommodation, dining, retail, transportation and health insurance.

#### EU Commission plans to double Erasmus budget

The European Commission has adopted its proposal to double the budget for the Erasmus program in the period 2021-2027 to €30 billion in a bid to provide mobility opportunities for 12 million people. The proposal intends to allocate €25.9bn for education and training, €3.1bn for youth and €550 million for sport, according to a statement. Beyond supporting learning and mobility for up to 12 million people, three times as many as in the current financing period – the EC proposal highlights the importance of reaching out to people from all social backgrounds.



#### Ulster University expands Chinese partnership



Ulster University has announced an expansion of its partnership with one of China's top-tier universities in an agreement that will facilitate collaborative research, open new opportunities for students and foster staff exchanges between both institutions. The expansion builds upon an existing 15-year partnership with Dongbei University of Finance and Economics, based in China's Liaoning province. By July 2018 it is expected the partnership will have enabled more than 200 Chinese students to complete part of their degree in Northern Ireland. There will be also new opportunities in the area of joint course development and for students from Ulster University Business School to study in China.

#### ASEAN international education growth lies in-country

Offshore branch campuses and in-country delivery will produce the most significant opportunities for providers to access more students, according to Michael Fay, director of the ASEAN Focus Group. But while there are opportunities, further work is needed on qualification recognition, facilities and English language adoption. Fay highlighted the increasing need for ELT within the region, with each of the ten ASEAN member countries having a different native language and inconsistent second language due to colonial influences. Executive director of state-funded think tank Penang Institute, Ooi Kee Beng agreed with Fay's comments, observing that "English is the language of globalization" globalization".



# 3 Ingredient Fruit Cake

This 3 ingredient fruit cake recipe just seems impossible until you see the result come out of the oven and can enjoy a delicious moist fruit cake.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 kg mixed dried fruit
- 2 1/2 cups (625ml) fruit juice
- 2 cups self-rising flour

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Place mixed dried fruit in a medium saucepan and pour over 2 cups of fruit juice. Bring to the boil, reduce heat to low and simmer for 3 minutes. Remove from heat and leave to cool for 2 hours.
- 2. Preheat oven to 150°C fan-forced or 170°C conventional. Line a 20cm round spring form tin with baking paper and set aside.
- 3. Sift the self-rising flour over the soaked fruit and stir well until completely combined. Use the remaining half cup of juice if needed to make a moist mixture. Then Pour into cake tin and bake for 2 hours on the lowest shelf. Remove from oven and leave cake to cool entirely in the tin. Wrap in foil and keep in an airtight container for 2-3 days before slicing.



# **Nutella Popsicles**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 cup full cream milk
- 1/3 cup Nutella



tate of Decay 2 sometimes feels like a far too real representation of the mundane reality that comes with surviving a zombie apocalypse. Consistently being on the hunt for food, resources to craft ammunition, and survivors to bolster your ranks doesn't always translate into a captivating game play loop especially when you're faced with horrors other than the countless undead that roam around you.

Like the first game from Undead Labs, State of Decay 2 infrequently checks in with an overarching narrative. You're given the choice of three pairs of survivors to start off with, each with their own bare-bones background stories. Those stories don't really matter, but your decision does define your starting area and the preliminary survivors you'll team up with to combat a growing sickness called the Blood Plague. The plague is the singular goal for you to work against, as your community strives to eradicate it from your town and build towards a brighter future.

That mission boils down to finding zombie-invested settlements that you'll need to first scout out and ultimately destroy, with grotesque, beating Plague Hearts at the center. These fights are the only real way to measure progression through State of Decay 2's otherwise open-ended campaign. Each settlement you conquer strengthens the rest, forcing you to step back and regroup before attempting to blow up the next. They're the toughest challenges the game has to offer, too, serving up waves of foes for you to fight as you

valiantly lob another Molotov at the heart, hoping it vaporizes and takes all the nearby undead with it. Unfortunately, they are basic action set-pieces at their core, without much variety to help shake up the otherwise monotonous scavenging that surrounds them.

State of Decay 2 is primarily about survival, and it bears all the baggage the genre is known for. Although you're spared the stress of dealing with individual meters for hunger and thirst, you'll instead be engaging with ones that affect your community. Food, medical supplies, and crafting materials all factor into the stability of your community, with the overall mood of your survivors governing how well you're doing. Supplies are littered around the dilapidated and abandoned settlements surrounding you, which are easily scouted with a little high ground. Your objectives hardly stray from going out, clearing an area of enemies, and scrounging around for consumables, gear, and large rucksacks of the more pertinent supplies you'll need to keep settlers happy.

The act of gathering these supplies is rarely gratifying, though. Although your settlement initially requires some quick work to get on its feet, State of Decay 2 hardly feels like it will fail you for slacking on your routine duties. Bugs are prominent too and can range from slightly annoying to near game-breaking. Graphical hitches are frequent, including enemies clipping through the environment and sometimes having entire hordes stuck on single piece of the environment.

Strange and Banner retrieve Tony Stark and brief him about the Infinity Stones and Thanos. Maw and Obsidian arrive in New York to seize the Time Stone from Strange, and Stark, Strange, Wong and Peter Parker confront them as Banner is unable to transform into the Hulk, having been traumatized by his defeat by Thanos.

Thor is rescued by the Guardians of the Galaxy, who had picked up the Asgardian ship's distress call. Thor guesses that Thanos would be after the Reality Stone, which is in the possession of the Collector in Knowhere, but first he must retrieve a new weapon from the dwarven planet of Nidavellir, where the only forge that can create such a weapon exists. Stark and Parker rescue Strange from Maw's torture, and throw Maw out of the ship killing him. The three leave to confront Thanos on Titan, where they meet Quill, Drax and Mantis and form a plan to remove Thanos' gauntlet.

Thanos' goal of eradicating half of all life in the universe comes to fruition as people begin disintegrating; those include Bucky, Groot, Parker, Quill, Strange, T'Challa, Wilson, Drax, Mantis and Maximoff all dissolve into ash. In Wakanda, only Rogers, Thor, Banner, Romanoff, James Rhodes, Rocket, Okoye and M'Baku remain of the heroes. On Titan, only Nebula and Stark are left alive. Thanos awakens fully healed in another planet and watches the sunset, satisfied at having achieved his ultimate goal.

#### Q. Tell us something about your academic and professional carrier?

#### Q. Share few thoughts about your department?



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
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

The Mi Band 2 is the latest wearable fitness tracker from Chinese hardware giant Xiaomi. It follows the cheap but feature-rich Mi Band and Mi Band 1S and introduces a screen for the first time in the well as improved pedometer tech, which Xiaomi to the battery.

Despite its low price point, the Mi Band 2 feels solid enough and looks a lot more impressive than the rather dull earlier models. As with previous Mi Bands, the Mi Band 2 comes in two distinct parts the module itself and the wrist strap it slots into. Assembling these two elements is the first thing you'll have to do when opening the packaging, and you'll need to repeat the trick every time you want to charge it, as the proprietary USB cable can't be connected when the main module is fixed to the strap.

The introduction of a screen might lead you to assume that Xiaomi is dipping its toe into smart watch territory with the Mi Band 2, but the focus here is still very much on fitness. Out of the box the first thing shown on the screen, after the time of day, is your total steps taken. Finally, it's possible to use the Mi Band 2 to bypass your phone's lock screen security. You can tell the phone to disable the lock when it senses that the device is nearby, which is quite a time-saver, but might not be of much use if you utilize fingerprint security, which only requires a touch anyway.

Mi Fit tracks and collates all of the data captured by the Mi Band 2 and presents it in a manner which makes it easy to see how you can improve your general fitness regime. The app isn't as great for giving health and fitness guidance, aspects you get from the likes of Jawbone's Smart Coach feature. You'll need the app if you want the Mi Band 2 to track your heart rate, as there's no way

of doing this with the device on its own.

While the Mi Band 2 provides plenty of data, the app could be stronger in presenting this information in actionable ways beyond just seeing historical patterns.



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
