Editorial NOTE





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Water found in the Atmosphere of a Planet beyond our Solar System

cientists for the first time have detected water in the atmosphere of an Earth-like planet orbiting a distant star, evidence that a key ingredient for life exists beyond our solar system.

Water vapor was found in the atmosphere of K2-18b, one of hundreds of "super-Earths" worlds ranging in size between Earth and Neptune - documented in a growing new field of astronomy devoted to the exploration of so-called exoplanets elsewhere in the Milky Way galaxy.

More than 4,000 exoplanets of all types and sizes have been detected overall. The latest discovery was reported in research by a team of scientists at University College London (UCL) published in the peer-reviewed journal Nature Astronomy.

"We found water," UCL astrophysicist Ingo Waldmann told Reuters of the breakthrough, revealed from observations made with the

Hubble Space Telescope, which analyzed starlight filtered through K2-18b's atmosphere.

More precisely, it marks the first time scientists have found water in the atmosphere around a super-Earth - as opposed to a gas giant - orbiting a star within its "habitable zone," just the right distance for liquid water to potentially exist on the surface.

Unfortunately, K2-18b orbits a dwarf star and lies 100 light years from Earth. While light from the sun takes several minutes to reach Earth, light from K2-18b's star takes a century to reach our planet, so for us to travel there is impossible. Aside from the tremendous distance separating Earth from K2-18b, the exoplanet is likely exposed to far more radiation than Earth, diminishing the prospects for life evolving there.

However, the discovery brings astronomers closer to answering the fundamental question of how unique Earth is in the universe.





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TELL ME WHY AMAZON RAINFOREST IS BURNING?

> he Amazon rainforest, the vessel holding a massive amount of the world's oxygen, is burning at a rate scientists have never seen before.

The Amazon is regarded as vital in the fight against global warming due to its ability to absorb carbon from the air. It's often referred to as the "lungs of the Earth," as more than 20 per cent of the world's oxygen is produced there.

While wildfires in the Amazon are not entirely uncommon, the way they are spreading is driving concern. The Amazon rainforest has been "fire-resistant" for much of its history because of its natural environment, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, but can go through hot spells.

While drought can be a factor in rainforest fires, INPE researchers have said there is nothing abnormal about the climate or rainfall amounts in the Amazon this year. "The dry season creates the favourable conditions for the use and spread of fire, but starting a fire is the work of humans, either deliberately or by accident," said, Alberto Setzer (INPE researcher).

Human activities; farming, mining and drilling are

what scientists say are exacerbating the situation now. In Brazil, cattle farmers start fires deliberately to clear forest to make way for ranching, and it's not always legal. In Mato Grosso and Para, where Brazil's agricultural frontier has expanded and pushed into the forest basin, more deforestation has been recorded and wildfires have increased.

The World Wildlife Fund estimates that more than a quarter of the Amazon will be without trees by 2030 if the current rate of deforestation continues. The fears surrounding deforestation have grown under Bolsonaro, who has vowed to develop the region for farming and mining since coming into office, ignoring international concern over deforestation and climate change.

Other countries working to fight climate change have started to take notice. Norway and Germany have pulled out of funding for projects to quell deforestation in Brazil. Environmental groups have also not shied away from firing back at Bolsonaro. Greenpeace called the president and his government a "threat to the climate equilibrium" and warned that Brazil would shoulder a "heavy cost" to its economy under his policies.

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INVENTION STORY OF RADAR

he first practical radar system was produced in 1935 by the British physicist Sir Robert Watson-Watt, and by 1939 England had established a chain of radar stations along its south and east coasts to detect aggressors in the air or on the sea. In 1935 Watson-Watt wrote a paper entitled "The Detection of Aircraft by Radio Methods". His idea was based on the bouncing of a radio wave against an object and measuring its travel to provide targeting information. It was called radar (radio detection and ranging). By the outbreak of the Second World War in September 1939, Watson-Watt had designed and installed a chain of radar stations along the East and South coast of England. Radar was also used by ships and aircraft during the war. Germany was using radar by 1940 but Japan never used it effectively. The United States had a good radar system and it was able to predict the attack on Pearl Harbor an hour before it happened.

INVENTION STORY OF CONTACT LENS

hough contact lenses seem to be a recent phenomenon, the famous Italian architect, mathematician and inventor Leonardo da Vinci (1452-1519) produced the first known sketches (in 1508) that suggested the optics of the human eye could be altered by placing the cornea directly in contact with water. In 1827, English astronomer Sir John Herschel proposed the idea of making a mold of a person's eyes. German glassblower F.A. Muller used Herschel's ideas to create the first known glass contact lens in 1887. In 1936, New York optometrist William Feinbloom (1904-1985) introduced scleral lenses made of a combination of glass and plastic that were significantly lighter than older glass-blown contacts. In 1948, California optician Kevin Tuohy (1919-1968) introduced the first contact lenses that resembled modern gas permeable (GP) contact lenses of today. Now, despite the availability of rigid gas permeable contacts that often provide sharper vision than soft lenses and extremely good oxygen permeability, more than 90 percent of contact lenses prescribed in the United States are soft lenses.

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SLEPLESSNESS LINKED WITH HIGH RISK OF HEART DISEASES: RESEARCHERS

eople suffering from insomnia (also known as sleeplessness, is a sleep disorder in which people have trouble sleeping) may have an increased risk of coronary artery disease, heart failure and stroke, according to new research in the American Heart Association's journal Circulation.

Data from more than a million people found that genetic liability to insomnia may increase the risk of coronary artery disease, heart failure and stroke. Among types of ischemic stroke, genetic liability to insomnia was primarily associated with an increased risk of large artery stroke.

Previous observational studies have found an association between insomnia, which affects up to 30% of the general population, and an increased risk of developing heart disease and stroke. These observational studies were unable to determine whether insomnia is a cause, or if it is just associated with them, explained Susanna Larsson, Ph.D., lead study author and associate professor of cardiovascular and nutritional epidemiology at Karolinska Institutet in Stockholm, Sweden.

In this first-of-its-kind study on insomnia, Larsson and a colleague applied Mendelian randomization, a technique that uses genetic variants known to be connected with a potential risk factor, such as insomnia, to reduce bias in the results. The 1.3 million participants with or without heart disease and stroke were drawn from four major public studies and groups.

Researchers found genetic variants for insomnia were associated with significantly higher odds of coronary artery disease, heart failure and ischemic stroke -- particularly large artery stroke, but not atrial fibrillation.

"It's important to identify the underlying reason for insomnia and treat it," Larsson said. "Sleep is a behavior that can be changed by new habits and stress management."

A limitation to this study is that the results represent a genetic variant link to insomnia rather than insomnia itself. According to Larsson, it was not possible to determine whether or not the individuals with cardiovascular disease had insomnia.



KPK Assembly approves Resolution to appoint Psychologists in Schools & Colleges

- Schools that are charging 5,000 PKR or more per month to have a psychologist as a part of faculty.
- Schools that are charging less than 5000 PKR are required to arrange at least a session per week with the psychologists.
- All the colleges are ought to have a psychologist as a part of the faculty.

hyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) assembly has adopted a resolution to have psychologists included as faculty in schools and colleges to cater to the students' emotional, behavioral, and educational needs. Pakistan Tehrik-e-Insaf (PTI) MPA Ayesha Bano presented the resolution which was passed with majority approval.

Even the children in today's world can't avoid serious traumatic conditions and resort to self-harm. They may become a victim of such traumatic conditions either because of their domestic issues or due to any kind of harassment or abuse that they have to suffer.

Now, Provincial Assembly of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa has adopted a resolution that would necessitate psychologists to be the part of faculty to cater to the educational needs of students apart from helping them to meet the emotional and behavioral issues. Ayesha Bano – Member of Provincial Assembly from PTI has issued a number of approved resolutions in this regard.

"It has been noticed that like adults, children also struggle with psychological pressure. Too many commitments, conflict in their families and problems with peers are all stressors that overwhelm children," states the resolution.

The resolution also highlighted that due to domestic issues and societal pressures, and due to lack of awareness children become afflicted on drugs and attempt suicide, adding that the child abuse incidents are frequently reported and are consistently on the rise.

The resolution requires schools that are charging 5,000 PKR or more than this amount per month to have a psychologist as a part of the faculty. Whereas the schools that are charging less than 5000 PKR are required to arrange at least a session per week with the psychologists to facilitate the students.

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Presence of psychologists in schools and colleges of Pakistan will allow students, families, educators, and members of the community understand and resolve both long-term, chronic problems and short-term issues that students are facing.

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imes have changed! While academic matters are still the main focus of schools, social, economic and political factors have altered the school environment. In this setting, school psychologists have emerged as advocates for children, providing compassion and guidance to ensure that students' emotional issues are addressed appropriately. School psychologists play various roles in the school system, including that of crisis counselors, testing facilitators and community outreach coordinators, among other roles.

The school psychologist may work as part of a team that includes the teachers, guidance counselor and social worker. The expertise of the school psychologist is especially helpful in addressing the needs of children with chronic conditions and making sure that they thrive in the classroom setting.

School psychologists play a crucial role in providing expert observations, testing and developing Individualized Education Plans that address the needs of children. It is unfortunate that misdeed and violence have extended to the schools. The fragile psyche of young students is greatly affected by witnessing or even just hearing of these incidents. The school psychologist should always part of the school crisis team that will be ready to provide counseling and emotional support to children touched by tragedies, including death of fellow students, teachers and other catastrophic events that may affect students directly or indirectly.

Youth violence includes different behaviors that can harm someone physically and emotionally.



School violence may happen on campus or offsite at school-sponsored events. Bullying, verbal threats, physical threats have, unfortunately, become part of the environment in some schools. In order to counter these issues, presence of a psychologist as a permanent member of the faculty or having regular sessions from a visiting psychologist is mandatory of schools and colleges in Pakistan.

Presence of psychologists in schools and colleges of Pakistan will allow students, families, educators, and members of the community understand and resolve both long-term, chronic problems and short-term issues that students are facing. They are a highly skilled and ready resource in the effort to ensure that all children and youth thrive in school, at home, and in life.

Moreover, psychologists may meet with students one-on-one or in groups to discuss specific academic, social, or emotional issues. Counseling sessions usually require the psychologist to write up a note about the content of the session and develop interventions that address students' needs (such as for anxiety or attention problems).

ducation is the fundamental right of every citizen of Pakistan, as the Article 25-A of the constitution of Pakistan compels the state to provide free and compulsory quality education to children of the age group of five to sixteen years. Yet, Private sector provides a great support to the government sector in uplifting the educational structure of Pakistan.

Government and Private sector, both are attempting their best to fulfill the duty of opening public and private sector schools, colleges and universities in order to provide education to the citizens of Pakistan. According to statistics, 35-40% of educational institutes are run by the private sector, while 60-66% of educational institutes are run by the public sector of Pakistan. These public and private sector institutes have collectively raised the literacy rate of Pakistan over the recent years. However, the syllabus which is being taught in government institutes is quite different from the syllabus being taught in private institutions.

Evidently, in a developing country like Pakistan, it is the duty of Public and Private sector to collectively coexist and fortify the education system of the country. At times, the private sector has to endure some rigid policies of government without the realization of the government that private sector plays a significant role in strengthening the educational setup. million children between the age of 5 and 16, 44 percent of the total population of this age group, are not in schools, which is the second-highest number in the world and is also a doubt on the performance of the government sector of Pakistan. Even tough, government schools and colleges have gigantic buildings, but the lack of facilities and quality teaching staff is wrecking the capacity of government sector to uphold the education system of Pakistan.

Instead of improving the infrastructure and appointing competent teaching staff in government schools, recently Punjab government has reportedly decided to hand over two thousand government schools to local non-government organizations (NGOs) and multiple NGOs have approached the provincial government requesting no-objection certificates (NOCs) for taking charge of these schools. The teachers' association of Punjab, on the other hand, seems to be devastated with this decision.

Moreover, lack of government funding has led three universities of KPK to go bankrupt due to financial crisis. The University of Peshawar, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Agriculture University and Gomal University Dera Ismail Khan are the universities that are tripping due to lack of funds.

The so-called Daanish Schools came under discussion when the Auditor General of Pakistan (AGP) reported that the "Punjab School Education Department" and the "Daanish Schools & Centres of Excellence Authority" have

combined irregularities of Rs 172.909 million. The audit report revealed irregularities including crooked appointments of staff without advertisement and approval, failure to deposit unspent balance into government treasury, overpayment of salaries, irregular expenditure on procurements, non-deduction of taxes and non-production of record for the audit spent on development work.

Nonetheless, there are some encouraging updates with respect to government's role in education division - as, recently the Federal Education Ministry claimed that it has enrolled over 7,000 out of school children in the first phase of enrollment drive. The government kick-started the second phase for out of school children in the federal capital. Federal Minister for Education and Professional Training Shafqat Mahmood formally launched the second phase while expressing the commitment to bring the out of school children to school. Under the enrolment drive, about 7,188 children have so far been enrolled. In the first phase, children between the ages of five and seven years were enrolled while in the second phase, children between the ages of eight and twelve years are being enrolled. Moreover, the government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) has rolled out a five-year education plan aimed to revolutionize the current education system of the province. The Ministry of Education Department of Primary and Secondary announced the plan for the next five years - from 2019 to 2023. The program includes teachers' training and curriculum reforms, establishment and upgradation of schools and appointment of new teaching staff. The department intends to hire 65,000 new teachers, including 11,000 primary teachers in the next five years.

Recently, Noshaba Zafar, the daughter of a truck driver, scored the highest marks in Punjab University's history. Noshaba also received Rs. 1 Lakh cash prize from the Vice-Chancellor of PU, Prof. Niaz Ahmed Akhtar. This vindicates the aptitude of students in the government institutes and if government improves the facilities and appoint quality teachers, then more students like Noshaba Zafar will emerge and take the education system and Pakistan towards excellence.









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Leadership is the Capacity to Translate Vision into Reality

In Conversation with **Nusrat Ahmed Hamdani**is the Founder & CEO of "Institute of Professional Excellence"

Q. Tell us about yourself and an account of your respective field?

Ans. Since, last 27 years I am serving in education field. I started my career as a teacher in 1993.

I have earned experience inteacher education, motivation at work, formation of policies and procedures, quality assurance, entrepreneurship and capacity building.

At the start of my career I didn't know much about teaching techniques, methods and approaches. Therefore, I left my job and set up my owned Institute where I can work independently. Q. Do you think Pakistan is growing in terms of education sector?

Keeping view my previous experience and thecurrent scenario; yes, when we compare public and private sector change is visiblein private sector whereproject based learning (PBL), 4Cs (communication, creativity, critical thinking &collaboration), all learning domains concentrated; cognitive, affective and psychomotor, SLOs planned & lesson planning is being done, teaching is shifted teacher to students centered. Group and pair work, role paly and project based presentation is used. Whereas, the government sector has more funds but change process is very slow.

Q. How can we produce quality teachers for our young students?

Ans. More training institutes should be set up across the country where training sessions should be held on a regular basis. "Attitude" "Skill" and "Ability"test of a teacher should be donebefore hiring. Pre and in-service trainings along with continuous professional development should be done. Mechanism for periodic performance review should be placed in all institutes.

Q. How can we inject the element of practical learning in our teachers?

Ans. Teaching profession has responsibility to educate the studentsand indevelopment of behaviors and skills. Therefore, teachers should be knowledgeable and trained to teach, understand child psychology and behavior, curriculum planning & review, community development and self-management. They should hold educational degrees e.g. B.Ed., M.Ed., MA.ELM and more others. Similarly, theoretical knowledge and teaching practice should be mandatory and prerequisite of teaching profession.

Q. Enlighten us about the various modes of effective teaching methods?

Ans. Multiple teaching techniques, methods and approaches should be used; as we taught language (English/ Urdu) as subject, therefore, we should improve and enhance skills (speaking, listening, reading and writing) in language teaching. On the other hand, in science and mathematics problem solving skills, discovery learning, inductive & deductive method, observation and analytical skills and experiential skills

should be enhanced. Learning objectives and learning outcomes and all activities should be well planned. Students should be allowed to share their ideas, thoughts, experiences, using language skills and show of their findings. They should be allowed to bring innovation and display their ideas in front of class so that their communication and creative skills can be enhance.

Q. If you could go in the past, is there anything that you would like to change?

Ans. Yes! Many things, above all, I wish could write biography of my father. As he was an officer in Pakistan Navy and an eye witnessed of many activities performed by Pak Navy in his tenure e.g. fall of Dhaka, 1965 and 1971 wars. He told me hundreds of stories which I heard multiple times, if I could have recorded them then I would easily have created a book out of it. Furthermore, if I could go back then motive youngsters to become artist, poet, writer or tourist. Pakistani Students in UK will now get a 2-Year Work Visa

nder the new proposals for international students' visa policy; Pakistani students will be able to stay in the United Kingdom for a period of two years after graduation. The UK Home Office has relaxed the visa policy to accommodate international students who were previously allowed to look for a job in the UK within 4 months of passing out from bachelors or masters degree programs.

AREA PERSONAL PROPERTY.

Now, all international students will be allowed to stay in the UK for two years after completing their graduation from a British university to find a job, under new proposals announced by the Home Office.

UK Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, believes that the new policy will enable students to find careers in the UK and 'unlock their potential'. The current visa policy for international students was formulated by Theresa May who was the Home Minister back in 2012. The Department of Education aims to increase the number of international students from 460,000 to 600,000 in the next 10 years.

The new move reverses a decision made in 2012 by former home secretary Theresa May that forced overseas students to leave four months after finishing their degree. Prime Minister Boris Johnson said the change would see students

"unlock their potential" and find careers in the UK.

The new policy will come into effect starting next year and it comes as good news for students from across the globe will now have more opportunities in the UK. Likewise, from next year, all international graduates will qualify for a two-year period to work in the UK, increasing their chances of finding long-term employment after studying. However, the student must be studying at an institution with a track record in upholding immigration checks.



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Western Union & TRUE North simplify Payments for Students

Western Union has announced a collaboration with TRUE North to enable students to pay tuition and expenses using a simplified payment process without hidden charges to the institution. The collaboration will leverage Western Union's international payments solution, GlobalPay for Students, to provide students and parents and agents the ability to review payment options in advance with a price comparison tool to lock-in exchange rates for up to 72 hours. The GlobalPay for Students platform provides transparency with the ability to track payment status through the online portal, mobile messages and email.


Harrow School Online set to launch in 2020



The UK's Harrow School has announced it will launch a "virtual sixth form" to teach A-levels online from September 2020. The Harrow School Online will charge £15,000-a-year, and students will receive one-on-one academic tutorials, live online lessons, and regular coaching sessions for support. The school expects to see demand from markets including China, Russia, Nigeria, UAE and Hong Kong, where the brick and mortar school currently sees significant interest. "We live in a rapidly changing world, and education must too adapt to the new challenges this presents, and reflect young people's lifestyles and aspirations," Harrow School Online's principal Heather Rhodes said.

NASA marked Megadeal with Lockheed for Moon Mission

NASA marked almost \$3 billion to Lockheed Martin to build three Orion capsules, to allow US astronauts to return to the moon by 2024. The megadeal calls for a first phase including three capsules for \$2.7 billion, for Artemis missions III to V, to take astronauts back to the moon. Each capsule can carry four astronauts. The space agency plans to order three more capsules during fiscal year 2022 for missions VI to VIII, for a total of \$1.9 billion, said a NASA statement. Six other capsules can be ordered later.



French Researchers building new Scanner to tackle Brain Disease



French researchers are developing what they say is the most powerful Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) scanner in the world which will use a supermagnet the weight of a blue whale and should allow earlier diagnosis of diseases such as Parkinson's. "We can potentially detect the disease in its earlier stages and, consequently, monitor it more precisely" Nicolas Boulant the project's scientific director, told Reuters. MRI, which has been in use for decades, allows physicians to see which parts of the brain have been damaged while a patient is still alive.

€60K Grant for Regional African University Program

The European Union is supporting the establishment of a regional virtual university for Eastern and Southern Africa, aimed at fostering regional integration in the 21 member-states Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA). The EU is extending €60,000 to support scholarships for a master's degree program in Regional Integration to be offered by Kenya's Kenyatta University in collaboration with other higher learning institutions from member states. Through the capacity building program of the Africa Caribbean and Pacific group known as TradeCom II, the grant will support the training of an initial group of 40 students.



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Quaid-e-Azam University Among Times Global Top 500 Rankings

Quaid-e-Azam University has made it to the top 500 universities around the world in Times Higher Education World University Rankings 2020. QAU is the only Pakistani university included in the 2020 edition of the annual ranking placed at number 401–500. The list ranked 1400 varsities from 92 countries across the world. Among them are 14 Pakistani universities listed below. Leading the ranking for the fourth consecutive year is the UK's University of Oxford. The California Institute of Technology has improved its ranking to grab the second place, while The University of Cambridge dropped to the third position.



Punjab Government Plans to Hand Over 2000 Schools to NGOs

Punjab government has reportedly decided to hand over two thousand government schools to local non-government organizations (NGOs). According to various reports, the procedural work for the handover has already been started. Meanwhile, multiple NGOs have approached the provincial government requesting no-objection certificates (NOCs) for taking charge of these schools. The teachers' association in Punjab, on the other hand, has rejected the decision calling it a breach of their contracts. They have threatened to launch massive protests across the province against the development.



UNIDO and NUST join hands for 'First Biomass Cluster in Pakistan'



The United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) and National University of Sciences and Technology (NUST) have joined hands for the development of first 'Biomass Cluster in Pakistan'. The core objective of the project is to promote market-based adoption of modern biomass energy conversion technologies for power generation in Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) and rural areas in Pakistan. An inaugural consultative meeting was held on Monday at the U.S Pakistan Center for Advanced Studies in Energy, NUST under the banner of UNIDO's Program Promoting Sustainable Energy production and Use from Biomass in Pakistan.

Bahria University Orders Strict Separation of Men and Women on Campus



Bahria University is famous for making controversial decisions which was criticized on the social media. "Seating of male and female student be separated in classrooms. Likewise, outstation visits and grouping in projects be also made separately," reads the notification. Last time, the university administration banned jeans, shorts, and T-shirts for female students and introduced shalwar kameez as the official dress code for them. Now, the varsity has gone a step farther to stop female and male students from being together anywhere on the campus. The wacky policy has also restricted them from taking part in group projects.

KPK Govt. Withdraws Notification of Compulsory Abaya for Girls

The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) government has withdrawn its earlier notification that mandated Abaya for school and college girls in the province. A notification circulated in Haripur district made it compulsory for female students of government institutions to cover themselves up adequately while going to schools or colleges. Adviser to Chief Minister on Elementary and Secondary Education Ziaullah Bangash said that the decision was taken after observing "some situations in various parts of the province." Succumbing to public backlash, the senior KP minister Shaukat Yousafzai announced that the notification had been retracted.

Supreme Court Reverts Private School Fees to January 2017 Level



The Supreme Court of Pakistan has struck down demands of increasing the school fee against the order of the apex court. Following the ruling, any illegal hike in fees would be considered null and void. Private school fees will now be reverted to January 2017's rates. A three-judge bench while hearing petitions regarding exuberant fee increase by private schools passed this judgment on Friday. The bench comprised of Chief Justice Asif Saeed Khosa, Justice Ijazul Ahsan and Justice Faisal Arab. "Excessively increased fee since 2017 in violation of the law", Court said.

Shafqat Mahmood urges Stakeholders to play vital role for Education



Federal Minister for Education and Professional Training, Shafqat Mahmood called upon all stakeholders to play their role in turning education sector into free of politics with major focus on up-gradation of standard and quality of the courses and training offered to the children and youth of the country. Inaugurating the National Institute of Virology at the Dr. Panjwani Center for Molecular Medicine and Drug Research (PCMD), University of Karachi, he said - the government was trying to unite all provinces on one point of education as this sector should be free from politics.

edically, depression must be diagnosed timely just like any other physical disease. People suffering from depression need love and attention the same way any other patient needs "Hopelessness" has been declared as a sin in Islam. Anyone who looks into the negative angles even in positive aspects of any matter of life can be considered a "Dejected Person". A dejected person remains in the state of an unknown fear; he considers a common rope as a snake to him; and his heart beat runs out of control on hearing even a slight sound/ voice. All the time, he remains in the state of an unknown fear; and ultimately such feelings overcome his personality. Whereas, one should always be ready to face/ overcome every problem of life bravely, otherwise survival in this world becomes very challenging. DENGUE: Signs, Symptoms, Prevention and Control

engue is a mosquito-borne viral disease which is transmitted by female mosquitoes mainly of the species Aedes aegypti and, to a lesser extent, Ae. albopictus. This mosquito also transmits chikungunya, yellow fever and Zika infection.

In Punjab, the number of dengue cases has risen to 3,709 as 133 new patients were diagnosed Monday with the epidemic virus.

Signs and Symptoms:

The disease has a sudden onset and symptoms may include;

- Fever for 3 to 7 days
- Intense headache and pain behind the eyes
- Muscle and joint pain
- Loss of appetite
- Vomiting and diarrhoea
- Skin rash

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• Bleeding, usually from the nose or gums.

Diagnosis:

Diagnosis of dengue fever is made by clinical presentation and a blood test.

Prevention and Control:


At present, the main method to control or prevent the transmission of dengue virus is to combat vector mosquitoes through:

• Preventing mosquitoes from accessing egg-laying habitats by environmental management and modification;

• Disposing of solid waste properly and removing artificial man-made habitats;

• Covering, emptying and cleaning of domestic water storage containers on a weekly basis;

- Applying appropriate insecticides to water storage outdoor containers;
- Using of personal household protection measures, such as window screens, long-sleeved clothes, repellents, insecticide treated materials, coils and vaporizers (These measures have to be observed during the day both at home and place of work since the mosquito bites during the day);
- Improving community participation and mobilization for sustained vector control;
- Applying insecticides as space spraying during outbreaks as one of the emergency vector-control measures;
- Active monitoring and surveillance of vectors should be carried out to determine effectiveness of control interventions.
